CCSR's Legacy

- For 23 years CCSR has worked consistently to open up local government to public access, insisting on reasonable meeting times, television coverage of City Council and Planning Commission meetings, and making certain that policy documents such as the General Plan have the imprint of public comment and concerns.
- As early promoters of an Urban Growth Boundary, CCSR negotiated Santa Rosa's first UGB restrictions in 1990, and then worked on the campaign for the voter-approved ballot measure that was passed in 1996.
- With our efforts, a Growth Management Ordinance and policy was enacted, along with the Housing Allocation Plan to assist in the development of affordable housing. Modifications proposed to weaken these policies have been passed over our public objection.
- CCSR promotes the development of progressive candidates for the City Council, and supports the appointments of progressive community members to City boards and commissions.
- CCSR has a reputation for fairness and civil participation in local governmental affairs that enables us to help represent the interests of the general public in an effective manner.
